REFERENDUM

Thursday 19th March 2020

It is time to vote on the Neighbourhood Plan. The independent examiner has issued his report and Horsham District Council have published their decision statement. So it's now up to you.

The vote will take place on Thursday 19th March in both Beeding and Bramber Village Hall and Small Dole Village Hall.

You will receive information on how to vote along with your voting card from Horsham District Council.

Please also take a look at our website where all the relevant documentation can be seen. If you do not have access to the internet there are hard copies of the documents for you to view at The Hub, Upper Beeding. The Parish Council Office, Upper Beeding and the Post Office in Small Dole. If you are unable to access any of these places please let us know by telephoning the Parish Council Office on 01903 810316.

The vote is a simple majority; therefore if only a few people turn out to vote it will be those few of you that determine the outcome of the Neighbourhood Plan.

By the time you receive this newsletter there will have been a number of opportunities to ask questions and find out more.

Neighbourhood Plan Frequently asked questions.

What is a Neighbourhood Plan?

A Neighbourhood Plan is a set of policies developed by the community giving greater control over where and how development takes place within the Neighbourhood Plan area.

What will happen if we do not have a Neighbourhood Plan?

If there is no Neighbourhood Plan, the Local Plan produced by Horsham District Council will take precedence.

If we do not agree the Neighbourhood Plan will there still be building in the Parish?

Absolutely, yes. The Government have revised housing numbers across the country. Horsham District Council have been directed to build a minimum of 965 houses per year. They will have to go somewhere.

How does a neighbourhood Plan protect the Parish?

The Neighbourhood Plan is a set of policies detailing sites, planning criteria, community assets, green spaces and a number of other factors to preserve the character of the Neighbourhood Plan Area.

Are there any financial implications for the Parish?

Yes. Parishes with a made Neighbourhood Plan (NP) will receive additional funding from developers via the Community Infrastructure Levy (CiL). Communities with a made NP receive 25% of the CiL whilst those without receive 15%. These monies must be used on capital projects within the community.

Will building definitely take place on the sites allocated?

The sites allocated have been identified as most suitable for development; however, this is not planning permission. Any potential developer will have to submit detailed plans which will be assessed against the policies in the Neighbourhood Plan. Any planning application will have to go through the normal planning process.

What will happen if a planning application is for a site that hasn't been identified in the Neighbourhood Plan?

A made Neighbourhood Plan carries a great deal of weight in the planning decision process, therefore any application for a development that is not within the remit of the Neighbourhood plan is very unlikely to be approved.

Can the Parish Council still object to planning applications?

The processing of a planning application remains unchanged. The Parish Council is a consultee with Horsham District Council as the decision makers so, yes, the Parish Council can object to any application and will consider each application on its own merit.

What will happen if I don't vote?

The referendum is determined by a straight majority vote; so the more people who vote, the greater the true representation of the residents.

I am still confused or don't understand.

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

Welcome to the first Parish Council newsletter for 2020. As I write the days are getting noticeably longer and the first crocuses and daffodils are starting to give a little colour in our gardens. The promise of spring starting is always a positive time.

The Parish Council worked on the 2020-21 budget over several months and set the precept of £199,125 at our January meeting. This is an increase of 13.79%, which amounts to 33p per week for a Band D household (£137.58 total per annum for Band D).

Every aspect of our annual and longer-term spending was considered. The Finance Committee looked at several options before deciding the increase that was finally agreed. It became clear during the process that the Parish Council needed to choose this option in order to ensure the long-term financial stability of the parish.

Critical needs in the budget were

- Replacing some services, such as cutting verges, largely ended by the County Council
- Saving for gradual replacement equipment in our children's play areas
- Increasing our reserves to comply with government and auditor's recommendations.

The full budget can be found on our website on the Accounts and Funding page.

On other matters, Horsham District Council is carrying out a consultation on the Draft Local Plan. (https://www.horsham.gov.uk/planning/local-plan/have-your-say). The consultation ends at 5pm on 30th March and is open to all for comment. There are two significant sites being proposed for housing in the plan, land east of Pound Lane in Beeding and land south of New Hall Lane in Small Dole. The Parish Council is also very concerned about the proposal for a new town, "Mayfield", east of Henfield. There is a serious risk that such a large development will affect the River Adur and increase the risk of flooding downstream in our community.

The increasing demand for councils to find sites for development comes from Central Government and local councils have little choice but to obey. There is also a requirement to take on housing numbers if a neighbouring authority cannot find suitable sites. The only way that this might be challenged is to write to our MP, Andrew Griffith (https://members.parliament.uk/member/4874/contact)

Hall for Hire!

Are you looking for an affordable, local space to hold an event this year?

Whether you are planning a special family gathering or looking for a suitable, accessible space for an one-off business meeting, training event or regular class Small Dole Village Hall may be the answer to your needs.

There has been a village hall in Small Dole more or less continuously since one was founded in 1911.

The village hall building comprises one large main room, a kitchen, and an annexe for the storage of tables and chairs. Through the annexe there are men's and women's lavatories and an accessible lavatory. All of the rooms are on one level and there are no steps to access the building from the car park, so it is thoroughly accessible for wheelchair users. The main room of the hall measures approximately 9.1m by 4.8m, and has a stock of 40 comfortable chairs and 13 folding tables.

The kitchen measures 3.4m by 3.6m with a door and servery giving access to the main hall. The kitchen is stocked with two kettles, a microwave, a fridge, and an electric hob and oven, besides a sink and separate hand basin and generous provision of crockery and cutlery.

There is a car park outside the village hall for the use of hall hirers, which can accommodate about a dozen cars.

The hall has its own website: www.smalldolehall.org.uk, and there you can find a calendar showing hall availability, contact details for hiring, events being hosted, and minutes of all the Management Committee Meetings.

Hiring the Hall

Hire of the hall includes use of the main hall, the kitchen and the lavatories, and is charged by the hour or part thereof.

Hire charges will be agreed with the Booking Secretary on first booking. Hirers will be charged according to the following categories:

Category A Small Dole Village Groups and Residents £7 p/h
Category B Groups and Residents from outside Small Dole £8 p/h
Category C All Commercial Users £9 p/h

The hire charges outlined here are accurate as of January 2018.

The hall may be booked on a one-off or recurring basis. To find out more, enquire about availability or make a booking, please contact the Booking Secretary.

Botanical Guide to Tottington Wood


Tottington Woodlanders are a group of volunteers who manage an area of ancient woodland in Small Dole. We have recently published a botanical guide to celebrate the diversity of plant life growing in Tottington Wood throughout the year.

According to the Sussex Biodiversity Record Centre, there are over 250 species of flowering plant in the wood. Our

book showcases a selection of these plants, beautifully illustrated with pictures taken by local photographer, David Pearce. Background information about the plants includes medicinal uses, folklore associations and their value to wildlife.

There are a significant number of **Ancient Woodland Indicator** species growing in the wood and their presence provides evidence that Tottington Wood has been in existence for at least 400 years. Tottington Woodlanders maintain the wood by adopting the same traditional coppicing techniques which would have been used over many centuries. This approach allows more light onto the woodland floor and encourages the growth of familiar springtime flowers, such as bluebells, wood anemones and primroses.

We hope that the botanical guide will encourage more visitors to come and enjoy this unique Local Nature Reserve. 'Tottington Wood Through the Year' is on sale from the Woodlanders at £5 a copy. Please contact annedaisybellis@hotmail.com


